Game Plan Highlights

Geography

New dedicated professional District Executive based in Qatar, hired and active for the Horizon District – the largest district in the BSA, serving the Middle East, Central Asia and Africa. Tremendous positive impact already seen.

Council Consolidated "802" units – serving youth wherever they live in TAC – now include a Cub family pack, a Scouts BSA girl troop, a Scouts BSA boy troop, a Venturing crew, and a Sea Scout ship. Blossoming in size and program – and a model for other councils.

"SpecTACular Extravaganza" virtual summer program held, combining online and local activity

Units added in Africa and Middle East

Inclusivity

Inaugural class of female Eagle Scouts earn their rank – 11 awarded to date

Girls increase to approx 15% of youth membership

Sustainability

TAC sets the gold standard in Scouting for efforts to improve human impacts upon the planet https://tac-bsa.org/sustainability/

At the individual level: annual Sustainability Challenge launched. Scouts, their parents, and their units learn about their impacts on the planet, take action, measure progress, and advocate to others.





At the council level: comprehensive Sustainability Action Plan adopted – the first of its kind in the BSA, possibly in all of Scouting. We are incorporating sustainability practices and training throughout our program. The Plan has six Action Areas, covering 73 Action Items. Among other goals, TAC will reduce council-level greenhouse gas emissions Below Net Zero by 2023 and plant a tree for every TAC Scout by 2025.

Normandy

Normandy Camporee 2022 planning moves from a Scout Executive-driven model to a volunteer-driven model of a dozen committees and an overall chair, engaging approx 100 volunteers, fully active 15 months before the camporee. https://tac-bsa.org/normandycamporee/

Generosity

Balanced budget achieved – in the face of Covid-driven cancellations of all council camps, while adding a critical new professional position

Annual Friends of Scouting fundraising campaign dramatically pivots to an increased total in a reduced time – targeting \$240,000 in only 3 months of activity, and reaching \$280,000 https://tac-bsa.org/donate/fos/

Normandy VIP donor reception raises funds in advance of the Camporee, eventually reaching \$80,000 https://tac-bsa.org/normandycamporee/sponsorship/

TAC's Religious Relationships Committee earns BSA's regional award for Religious Relationships, in its first year of eligibility

More than 1,000 new youth recruited in Fall 2021

Launched new website; optimized digital processes facing members, leaders and donors; produced two weekly newsletters (TAC Connection and Normandy News); brought together leaders from across TAC effectively on video, driving high committee engagement to serve youth across TAC
